

FROM FATHER STEVE



Dear Friends,

The Minister of the Congregation is directed to instruct the people, from time to time, about the duty of Christian parents to make prudent provision for the well-being of their families and of all persons to make wills, while they are in health, arranging for the disposal of their temporal goods, not neglecting, if they are able, to leave bequests for religious and charitable uses. (BCP 445)

Andrew Carnegie said, “The man who dies rich dies disgraced.” He, of course, was referring to money, not the richer blessings of life that come from faith, family, friendships and the other good blessings from God. Money, too, can be a blessing if it is looked upon as a gift to be shared, used well, and not hoarded or spent solely for self-serving purposes. Very few things can provide the joy that giving and generosity produces. Carnegie understood this and he practiced generosity every day. Of the more than \$500 million Carnegie made in his lifetime, he gave away over \$350 million while living and in his will left the bulk of the remainder not to his already wealthy family but to causes benefiting society.

I hope you have all taken the not too troublesome time to make a will, and I hope that it includes bequests to the church and, perhaps, other charitable causes. I also hope we are all practicing generous giving now. I know that is true for most of you. We have some things coming up to celebrate that are the result of just such giving. Thanks to you all, we will soon be paying off our longstanding loan for our building addition project. Thanks to the generosity of a deceased parishioner’s will and an estate gift to St. Paul’s, we soon be underway with the renovation and remodeling of our kitchen and parish hall. That gift will cover the cost of the kitchen remodel completely and hopefully stretch into the parish hall for some long overdue refurbishment of that space. The estate gift won’t be enough to include everything though, and that gives us all an opportunity to share in that work and extend our own generous giving, as we are able, and beyond the giving we already do through our annual pledges.

Included in this month’s Herald is a Gifts and Memorials list as well as a list of items and expenses we’ll need to complete our parish hall project “completely.” Take a look and see if there is something you can do to help us along. Once we get the Parish House project done, we’ll have both buildings in great shape, and with no debt, ready to welcome a new rector and to serve our church and community for generations to come!

Lastly, don't forget St. Paul's Endowment Fund. This fund as it grows will help support not only the church's operation expenses but also its ministry programs and outreach. There are several ways you can give to the endowment (and you don't have to be a Carnegie to participate!). It can be a small or large amount, given now or in your will. But because all gifts are pooled together in this fund that only uses the generated interest and never the principal, every gift is significant and helps grow the fund, which in turn will help support St. Paul's program, outreach and general mission. Each dollar given will be there as a perpetual gift, because the principal is never spent; every dollar given yesterday, today, and tomorrow adds to the fund's total amount and its eventual scope of work.

Thank you for what you already do to support the church. The main work of church is giving. Join in that work and help provide for St. Paul's mission and ministry today, and tomorrow, and for all the years to come.

Beware of the Gift Card Scam

There is a current scam going around where the scammer uses the names of our Bishop, clergy (me), or parish leaders to try and solicit gift card donations. Recently, two of our parishioners received texts or emails, supposedly from me, asking for "a favor." There may be more of you that have been contacted. It's a very common scam that often begins, "I'm in a meeting right now so I can't call. I need your help with something urgent." Or "Sorry to bother you. I'm in an important meeting and need a favor." The request is usually for you to go and purchase gift cards and to contact "me at this email or this number" when done. If you fall for it and buy the cards, the scammer will then ask you for the pin numbers. If they get that they can spend all the money on that card without actually having the card. You'll be left with gift cards worth nothing and your money will be gone. It's very easy for online scammers to find out who the priest or warden or another leader is by going to an organization's website, LinkedIn, etc. and start impersonating them. It's also very easy to find good people who just want to help their priest or another leader out. So easy, in fact, that over \$150 million dollars was stolen in this way over the past year!

Please don't fall for this scam. Be skeptical of any calls you receive similar to this. I can assure you, if I need a favor like this from you, I'll wait until I'm available to call you personally or come and see you in person. Do not trust texts or emails asking for money favors. Check the telephone number or email carefully. If a scammer is using an email, they'll create an address that is almost, but not quite, the same as the person they are impersonating. The message may be different from the ones above. Requests may come as an email or text message. Never give out pin numbers, passwords, Social Security Numbers or banking information over the phone to anyone!

This would allow us to broadcast parish meetings, special events, special classes, etc.

New 60-inch Flat Screen TV and rolling stand for Parish House (approx. \$800)

We need a large screen TV for receiving broadcasts, showing DVDs charts, graphs, PowerPoint presentations, and other educational materials.

12 ft. Conference Table (approx. \$900)

Table that will seat 12 to 14 people for vestry, committee meetings, book group, etc. At other times this will be used as a reception table

Organ Refurbishment (to solid-state) (Approx. \$40,000) * Priority

Organ (add pedal stop) (approx. \$4,000) *

Parish House Flooring (\$8000-\$10000 carpet; \$15-20,000 hard flooring)

(Partial gifts toward this need gratefully accepted)

Parish House Lighting (hanging fixtures (6) \$8-900 each or \$5,000 total)

New tables and chairs for the Parish Hall (see Parish House Gifts on next page)

Parish House Renovation and Refurbishment Gifts

While there may be some funds left over from a designated gift for the kitchen renovation that can be used in the parish hall space. Additional monies will be needed. Once the kitchen is finished, we'll know more about where we are, but if you see something here you'd be interested in helping with, please know that your additional funds will be used toward general refurbishment or if you so desire toward an expressed item or purpose.

Some Parish House gifts appear on the Gifts and Memorials list as well as this one. Pledges toward any items below (for all or part of the expense) will be gratefully accepted.

Flooring for the parish hall (\$3-4 per sq. ft.) or \$8-10,000 total for carpet; \$15-20,000 for hard floor

(Partial gifts toward this need are gratefully accepted)

Window treatments (6) \$200 per window

New light weight tables (10) = \$400 each

New more comfortable folding chairs (100) = \$50 each

Hanging light fixtures (6) = \$8-900 each or \$5000 total)

ADD THE CHURCH DIRECTORY TO YOUR PHONE!

We have posted this in the newsletter more than a few times, but we continue to get calls in the office asking for a new directory or someone's phone number. We are happy to help you from the office, but if you have a cell phone, you can have the church directory as an app on your phone! And not only that, but every time we update the directory in the office, it will automatically update the directory on your phone! Here is how to install the directory on your phone, so that it's there and handy whenever you need it. (Do it now, so you don't forget.)

1. Look for the app on your phone that says "Instant Church Directory" and look for this icon.



If you don't see it, put "Instant Church Directory" in your "search apps" bar.

It should come up at the top of the page. Look for the icon above.

2. Click on the "**Install**" button.
3. Once installed, click on the "Open" button.
4. Click on the "**Create login**" button.
5. Enter your email address as it appears in the church's directory, and create a password. The password must be at least 8 characters long and must include at least two of the following special characters: capital letters, numbers, or symbols. Retype the password to confirm it and click on **Create Login**.
6. Now, go to your email inbox and check for an email from service@instant church directory.com.
7. You're almost done. To complete the sign-up process, you verify your email address by clicking on the link sent to you in that email.
8. Once you confirm your email, you can open the app and click **Sign in** to log into your church directory.

It's simple and you only have to do the above procedure once. From then on, you just tap on the church directory icon and the directory opens. You don't even have to sign in. So don't wait. Go for it! (If you need help, bring your phone to the church office and we'll install it for you.)

Don't want the directory on your phone? Then the directory is available on the church website. Go to stpaulslvn.org, scroll to the bottom of the home page and click on a big orange button that says parish directory. You'll be prompted to enter a password. Enter the password and an up-to-date directory will appear. **Why a password?** So just anyone can't have access to parishioner information. The directory is for St. Paul's members. You should know/keep the password. It doesn't change, but you can't get in without it. If you don't know the password, call the church office and we'll give it to you.

But do the phone app too! It's cool!

Hello fellow parishioners of St. Paul’s Episcopal Church. We are at our next step in our search for a new Priest: getting your feedback. Please complete the Parish Questionnaire **on the next page of this newsletter** to provide the search committee information about what you, the congregation, are looking for in our next Priest. Your answers will inform the Search Committee’s review and ranking of available candidates. When you’ve completed this questionnaire, please bring it to the Church and place it in the drop box on the table in the crossing, or mail to/drop it by the church office by 10 July. With our current budget, it is unlikely we can offer a salary, benefits, and pension to attract a full-time Priest so we, the Vestry, are leaning toward a part-time Vicar, working 3-days a week plus Sunday. If our budget changes, we will adjust our search criteria accordingly. I will continue to provide updates throughout the process. I encourage you to speak with any member of the Vestry or Search Committee at any time. We appreciate your prayers, thoughts, and feedback as we make this important decision. (*Questionnaires were provided at church on June 12, in this newsletter, and will be mailed to you upon request. Complete one per individual.*)
